There is a story of an old man that was in the habit of walking along the beach every morning before work. One morning, after a terrible storm had passed, he observed that the beach was full of starfish that had washed up on shore. He knew that once the sun rose they would all die. Way off in the distance he saw a young boy picking up one starfish after another and throwing it back into the sea. As he approached he said to the boy, "there are too many starfish you can't make a difference." As the boy threw another one back into the sea he said, "It made a difference to that one!!"

In February Morn Chin, a representative of A Great Door Ministries and leader of our Cambodia projects, traveled back to Cambodia and was able to distribute 1,900 pounds of rice, sleeping mats, sardines, fish



sauce, cooking oil, blankets and mosquito nets to 19 families in Kompong

Speu Province on behalf of A Great Door Ministries. Being indigenous Morn is able to work easily with local leaders and monks to locate the poorest of the poor in their regions.



Each family received 100 pounds of rice, sardines, fish sauce, cooking oil, a sleeping mat, a blanket and a mosquito net. Enough to sustain them for 3-4 months.

### Dreams on Hold

This beautiful 17 year old girl sits by her father who was paralyzed by a recent stroke. Her father struggled to make money for his family by carrying water. One day while going up a steep hill he suffered a devastating stroke that left him paralyzed and



no longer able to care for his family. His daughter's future is now uncertain as she is no longer able to attend school but

must spend her days helping her family.

By not being able to attend school her chances of breaking this vicious cycle of poverty are very unlikely.
